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AIRLIFT CONTROL FLIGHTS

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This mission directive prescribes the mission, organization, and responsibilities for Air Force Reserve Command (AFRC) airlift control flights (ALCF).

SUMMARY OF REVISIONS

This revision redesignates the Air Force Reserves (AFRES) to Air Force Reserve Command (AFRC), captures changes to mission due to reorganization and updates the organizational chart.

1. Mission:

1.1. Peacetime. The mission of ALCFs is to train to provide on-site management of mobility airfield operations at operating locations. ALCFs manage, coordinate, support, and control air mobility missions to assure maximum effectiveness of resources performing the air mobility mission; plan and coordinate exercises and special mission operations; configure tanker airlift control elements, to include operations, maintenance, and aerial port functions; and deploy to forward operating locations to fill supervisory positions within the established global command and control structure. Conducts Air Mobility Command (AMC) affiliation program, performs airfield surveys, and manages aircrew stage operations..

1.2. Wartime Emergencies. Governed by gaining command directives upon mobilization.

2. Command. The peacetime structure of the AFRC ALCF maintains effective operations with minimal expenditure of resources and minimizes organizational turbulence upon wartime mobilization. Functional statements, applicability, and organizational structure are in attachment 1, attachment 2, and attachment 3.

3. Assigned Forces. During peacetime status and 2 weeks of annual training, the ALCF is under the direct control and supervision of the AFRC operations group to which assigned. Under Presidential

call-up pursuant to Title 10 U.S.C. 12304, administrative jurisdiction remains unchanged. Operational control transfers to the commander of the gaining command. Under full mobilization authority, command jurisdiction transfers to the commander of the unit to which assigned by the gaining command.

4. Relationship to Other Units. Established command channels apply. Communicate directly with the gaining major command on matters relating to training, inspection, operational mission coordination, logistical support, and safety. Forward copies of correspondence to the respective numbered air force to which assigned and to the HQ AFRC functional manager..

5. Special Instruction. Deviations to the organizational structure depicted in attachment 1 and attachment 3 require prior approval of HQ AFRC/XPM. Submit deviations requiring Air Force approval (those not in compliance with the provisions of AFI 38-101, *Air Force Organization*) according to AFI 38-101, chapter 5. All other deviations/changes include as a minimum:

- 5.1. Resumes of each recommended change with narrative justification. Also, a brief discussion of why the current organization is ineffective.
- 5.2. Current and proposed organization charts down through the lowest level, authorized and proposed manpower by grade, Air Force specialty code, and number.
- 5.3. Functional statements in brief and concise language, present tense, restricted to major functions or programs of the activity.
- 5.4. Position descriptions for any new or revised civilian positions.

Attachment 1

FUNCTIONAL STATEMENT FOR AIRLIFT CONTROL FLIGHTS

PLANS: Provides air mobility support capability to operate at worldwide locations where no air mobility exists. Furnishes minimum essential onload, offload, and enroute turnaround mission support during deployment, employment, and redeployment operations. Commands air mobility forces at operating locations. Conducts AMC affiliation program and performs airfields survey.

TRAINING: The training element is responsible for ensuring training according to Air Force and specific provisions of AFMCI 10-202 V4, Combat Logistics Support, 5 May 97. The element tracks currency of all individuals, establishes annual training plans, and maintains the job qualification standard (JQS) to certify task certifications. Element establishes proficiency, evaluates requirements, and recommends individuals to the commander for certification.

AFFILIATION: The affiliation element establishes a liaison between airlift users and the ALCF. The element is responsible to provide the Army, Navy, Air Force, and Marine Corps mobility units training through the affiliation program in joint combat airlift planning. These elements emphasize airlift movements, airlift aircraft, forces responsibilities, joint inspections, palletization, weighing and marking cargo, and load planning principles. The ALCF units provide the affiliated units the training to be self-supporting in moving by air fast and efficiently to respond to worldwide contingencies.
