This mission directive prescribes the mission and establishes the responsibilities for Air Force Reserve Command (AFRC) aircraft maintenance squadrons (AMXS).

SUMMARY OF REVISIONS

This revision redesignates the aircraft generation squadrons as aircraft maintenance squadrons to comply with HQ USAF PAD 02-05, CSAF Direction to Establish a New Combat Wing Organization Structure. A bar (|) indicates revisions from previous edition.

1. Mission:

1.1. Peacetime. The mission of the AMXS is to provide a level of readiness sufficient to perform organization and limited intermediate level maintenance on unit-equipped/ associate aircraft, transient aircraft, and related ground equipment. AMXS provide a trained mobility maintenance force on an "as required" basis and operational aircraft for the peacetime flying program.

1.2. Wartime/Emergencies. Governed by gaining major command directives.

2. Command. AMXS are USAF controlled AFRC units assigned to AFRC maintenance groups. AMXS peacetime structure maintains effective operations with the least expenditure of resources and minimizes organizational turbulence upon wartime mobilization. AMXS functionally align for structural compatibility with their active duty counterparts.

3. Assigned Forces. While in peacetime status and during 2 weeks of annual training, the AMXS are under the direct control and supervision of the AFRC maintenance group to which assigned. Under Presidential call-up pursuant to Title 10 U.S.C. 12304, administrative jurisdiction remains unchanged. Operational control transfers to the commander of the gaining command. Under mobilization authority, command jurisdiction transfers to the commander of the unit to which assigned by the gaining command.

4. Relationship to Other Units. Established command channels apply. Communicate directly with the active duty advisory unit/active duty advisors on matters relating to training, inspection, and safety. Send a copy of such correspondence to the respective unit to which assigned.
