This mission directive states the mission and establishes the responsibilities for an Air Force Reserve Command (AFRC) maintenance operations squadron/flight (MOS/MOF).

SUMMARY OF REVISIONS

This document is substantially revised and must be completely reviewed.

It complies with HQ USAF PAD 02-05 direction to establish the combat wing organization structure.

1. Mission. Develops and publishes the wing flying/maintenance schedule, determines long-term fleet health maintenance priorities, assigns priorities for and coordinates use of shared maintenance facilities, provides trend analysis information, and provides supply liaison and engine management support for flight line and back shop maintenance requirements.

1.1. Peacetime. The primary mission of the maintenance operations squadron/flight is to provide plans, programs, administrative support and training management for aircraft maintenance. Plans, schedules, and coordinates all maintenance accomplished on aircraft and associated equipment. Provides maintenance supply liaison and engine management support for flight line and back shop maintenance requirements for the wing/group mission and installation operations. Provides unit administrative service for all assigned/attached personnel, the maintenance group commander, and staff.

1.2. Wartime Emergencies. Governed by gaining command directives upon mobilization.

2. Command. MOS/MOF are assigned to AFRC maintenance groups. Their peacetime structure design maintains effective operations with the least expenditure of resources and minimizes organizational turbulence upon wartime mobilization.

3. Assigned Forces. While in peacetime status and during two weeks of annual training, the MOS/MOF is under the direct control and supervision of the group to which assigned. Under Presidential call-up pursuant to Title 10 U.S.C. 12304, administrative jurisdiction remains unchanged. Operational control transfers to the commander of the gaining command. Under mobilization authority, command jurisdiction transfers to the commander of the unit to which assigned by the gaining command.

4. Relationship to Other Units. Established command channels apply. Communicate directly with the active duty advisory unit/active duty advisors on matters relating to training, inspection, and safety. Send a copy of such correspondence to the respective unit to which assigned.
