This publication supplements AFI 36-2225, 1 September 1997. It applies to AMC active duty security forces, Individual Mobilization Augmentees (IMAs), wartime-gained Air National Guard (ANG) and Air Force Reserve Command (AFRC) security forces upon mobilization when published in the ANGIN2 and AFRCIND2.

1.3.5.10. (Added) The Stan-Eval and Training sections will jointly prepare a task performance checklist for local training. This checklist will include briefings on Exercise Safety Requirements, Uniform, Equipment and Weapons Checks (conducted utilizing the “buddy system” to ensure live ammunition is not introduced into an exercise scenario), Firing Range Safety Procedures (if live firing will occur), and Emergency Procedures (refer to AFI 31-207). These briefings will be conducted before any exercise scenarios are conducted.

1.6.2.1. (Added) When developing localized TEEOs for Standardized Evaluation exercises, GCS training, field training, Emergency Services Team training, and all teams training for Security Forces competitions (Defender Challenge and Rodeo), all units will designate an overall Exercise Supervisor in the grade of E-5 or above who is in charge of all Observer/Controllers. The Exercise Supervisor will ensure that only “exercise-safe” magazines (a standard magazine with the bottom one-third painted blue) are loaded with blank rounds of ammunition. Should “real world” security be required in the play area, all magazines will have the bottom one-third painted red and the individual carrying that weapon will wear an orange reflective vest. The Exercise Supervisor, the Observer/Controllers, and all personnel performing “real world” security duties will be non-players and responsible for all aspects of ground, weapon, vehicle and explosive safety. The Exercise Supervisor and Observer/Controllers will be responsible for conducting inspections of weapons and ammunition to ensure no live rounds are introduced into the exercise and maintain 100% accountability of all unexpended ammunition. In addition, they will also be

responsible for maintaining radio or telephonic contact (if out of radio contact) with the Security Force Control Center.
