



**AIR FORCE MOTOR VEHICLE TRAFFIC
SUPERVISION**

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AFI 31-204, 14 July 2000 is supplemented as follows: The purpose of this supplement is to assign responsibilities and establish procedures for motor vehicle traffic supervision on Fairchild AFB, WA. This publication requires collecting and maintaining information protected by the Privacy Act of 1974 as authorized by 10 USC 8013. Systems of records notice F031 AF SP K, *Vehicle Administration Records*, applies. Maintain and dispose of records created as a result of processes prescribed by this supplement in accordance with AFMAN 37-139, *Records Disposition Schedule*. Ensure all records created by this supplement containing FOUO information are marked "FOR OFFICIAL USE ONLY" at the bottom of each page IAW DOD 5400.7-R, *DOD Freedom of Information Act Program*. Ensure each paragraph containing FOUO information is marked as such. Ensure all records created by supplement are maintained and disposed of IAW AFMAN 37-139, *Records Disposition Schedule*. Ensure all records created by this instruction containing FOUO information are marked "For Official Use Only" at the bottom of each page IAW DOD 5400.7-R. Ensure each paragraph containing FOUO information is marked as such. AFI 31-204, *Air Force Motor Vehicle Traffic Supervision*, 14 July 2000, is supplemented as follows:

SUMMARY OF REVISIONS

This is the annual update publication of AFI 31-204/FAFB SUP 1. It applies to all Air Force, civilian, and Department of Defense (DoD) personnel operating motor vehicles on Fairchild AFB. Mostly minor changes: The section of seat belts, under chapter 2 was added, the term SPTG was replaced with MSG, the term 92d Support Group was changed to 92d Mission Support Group. This instruction does apply to Guard and Reserve Personnel. **A bar (|) indicates revisions from the previous edition.**

1.4. (Added) **Territorial Applicability.** This supplement applies to all owners and operators of motor vehicles on Fairchild AFB and its associated properties. All vehicle operators, including bicyclists, who are granted the privilege of driving/biking within the jurisdiction of Fairchild AFB are subject to the conditions of this instruction.

2.5.1.4. (Added) Suspension of Driving Privileges. The 92 MSG/CC and 92 MSG/CD shall be the designated representatives of the installation commander for the purpose of initiating administrative suspension or revocation actions.

2.5.1.4.1. (Added) The 92 MSG/CC or 92 MSG/CD must direct any suspension of driving privileges.

2.5.1.4.2. (Added) Temporary approval may be granted telephonically.

2.5.1.4.3. (Added) All letters concerning suspension or revocation will bear the 92 MSG/CC or 92 MSG/CD's signature. The use of a "signed" stamp is not authorized.

2.5.1.4.4. (Added) The installation commander's representative may impose multiple suspensions to run consecutively.

2.5.1.5. (Added) Requests for Suspensions. Unit commanders may request the suspension of an individual's driving privileges, under their command, if they have exhibited a trend for the disregard of traffic laws, driving in an unsafe manner, using poor judgment, etc. Requests will be sent through 92 SFS/SFAR to 92 MSG/CC or CD, in letter format, citing the reason(s) for the request and the recommended length of the suspension.

2.5.1.6. (Added) Immediate Suspensions. A suspension notice will be issued and served to the individual as soon as possible, and will go into effect immediately upon issuance, (will remain in effect until an administrative hearing is offered, normally within 10 days), when charged with:

2.5.1.6.1. (Added) Driving while intoxicated, with a Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) result of .08% (or the assimilated state law) or higher will result in a 12-month suspension.

2.5.1.6.2. (Added) Driving with a BAC of .02% or above while under the age of 21 will result in a 12-month suspension.

2.5.1.6.3. (Added) Refusal to submit to or complete a breathalyzer and/or blood test to determine BAC level will result in a 12-month suspension.

2.5.1.6.4. (Added) Driving on the installation while the operator's license is suspended will result in a 24-month suspension.

2.5.1.7. (Added) Other Suspensions. All other instances where a suspension may be imposed will be coordinated with 92 ARW/JA. Other instances when a driver may be suspended include:

2.5.1.7.1. (Added) Receiving four non-moving violations within a four-month period; or,

2.5.1.7.2. (Added) Receiving two moving violations within a 30 day period; or,

2.5.1.7.3. (Added) Receiving a total of five citations, moving or non-moving within six months.

2.5.1.7.4. (Added) Accumulating 12 points within 12 consecutive months or 18 points within 24 months will result in a 1-year suspension.

2.5.1.7.5. (Added) A driver may be suspended for a maximum of six months for violating the Washington State Open Container Law.

2.5.1.7.6. (Added) Speeding 15 MPH or more over the posted speed limit in the housing area(s) and speeding 20 MPH or more over the posted speed limit on the rest of the installation may result in a suspension of up to 12 months of on-base driving privileges.

2.5.1.7.7. (Added) Unauthorized parking in designated handicapped parking areas will result in the loss of on-base driving privileges for a minimum of 30 days. Any consecutive violations may result in loss of driving privileges for a period of six months.

2.5.1.7.8. (Added) Refusing to submit to a Base Entry/Exit Point Check as directed by the Installation Commander.

2.5.1.7.9. (Added) Drivers not yielding to pedestrians in a marked crosswalk.

2.5.1.7.10. (Added) Drivers failing to yield to emergency response vehicles.

2.5.1.7.11. (Added) When a civilian driver accumulates six or more points in a six-month period, or three or more parking citations in a twelve-month period, he or she will be notified by mail that additional citations could result in the suspension of base driving privileges. The Chief, Administration and Reports Branch will sign this letter.

2.9. Restoration of Driving Privileges Acquittal. Driving privileges are automatically reinstated when the period of suspension expires. Documentation to remove the individual from the suspension listing will be initiated by 92 SFS/SFAR. For revocations based on DUI charges (including refusal to submit to a breath or chemical test) attendance at a substance abuse seminar is required. Reinstatement of Government Vehicle Driving Privileges. (*Before a request can be submitted, the individual must have completed the remedial drivers training course.*) To reinstate limited government driving privileges while suspension/revocation is in effect, unit commanders must submit a written request citing the reason(s) for reinstatement. For off-base DUI charges, all civil action must be complete and action taken must be included in the request before limited privileges can be requested. The unit commander's request is sent to 92 SFS/SFAR, endorsed and forwarded to the 92 MSG/CC or CD. As a general rule, personnel having their driving privileges revoked for intoxicated driving will not be granted their government motor vehicle driving privileges for at least twelve months. Earlier reinstatements will be on a case-by-case basis.

2.9.6. (Added) Unit commanders must ensure personnel are scheduled through 92 ARW/SEG for a driver's improvement course. This is not a DUI remedial course, but one designed to re-educate problem drivers on the rules of the road.

2.10.3. (Added) Any person whose on-base driving privileges are suspended, but their state driving privileges have not been revoked/suspended, may drive up to base entry points, but may not attempt to drive through the gates. Authorized Parking Area for Suspended Drivers. The vehicle(s) must be parked in an area designated by the Installation Commander or removed from the confines of Fairchild AFB and its properties. The only authorized designated parking area on Fairchild AFB is located just West of Graham Road adjacent to the installation's back gate.

3.1.1. Vehicle Registrations: Vehicles will be registered within five duty days of arrival on Fairchild AFB. Vehicle owners must ensure their paperwork is in order prior to this deadline (i.e. current vehicle registration, valid insurance, and a valid driver's license).

3.1.1.3. (Added) Motorcycle operators must register the motorcycle on the next duty day, following course completion, presenting the course card as proof of attendance. Additionally, motorcycle riders must be licensed for the operation of such vehicles by Washington State, their state of legal residence or from the applicants last state of assignment providing it has not expired since their PCS.

3.1.5. Newly purchased vehicles will be registered using the AF Form 75, **Temporary Visitor's Pass**, for the period of the temporary state vehicle registration plus five duty days. Upon receiving the permanent registration, the registrant will permanently register the vehicle prior to expiration of the AF Form 75.

Temporary vehicle passes for motorcycles will be issued at the Visitors Center for a period not to exceed three days. During these three days, motorcycle registrants must obtain a letter through 92 ARW/SE to 92 SFS/SFOSI, who will issue an AF Form 75 with an expiration date as of the duty day following completion of the motorcycle safety course.

3.2. **Registration and Driver Requirements.** Failure to provide valid and current paperwork listed above may result in a background check through the Washington Crime Information Center (WACIC) or National Crime Information Center (NCIC).

3.2.2. (Added) Vehicles owned by a licensed dependent, whose sponsor is assigned to FAFB, will be registered in the name of the sponsor.

3.4.1. Pass and Registration is responsible for issuing DD Forms 2220, **DoD Registered Vehicle Certificate**, to authorized personnel on Fairchild AFB. Under no circumstances will unauthorized personnel be issued a DD Form 2220. Prior to issuance of a DD Form 2220 the owner/operator must present a certificate of competence for attending and completing a motorcycle safety course. The 92 ARW/SE office is responsible for this program, which is mandatory for motorcycle operators regardless of status. Only retired military or civilians are exempt from this requirement. In addition to registering their vehicle on base any motorcycle operator must provide their name to the unit safety representative for tracking purposes.

3.4.4. The Washington State Patrol allows placement of decals on the driver's side so long as it does not obstruct the view of the Vehicle Identification Number or the driver's clear view. This applies only to Washington State registered vehicles; other states may have restrictions against such provisions.

3.4.6. (Added) Legible DD Forms 2220 issued by other installations will be validated for Fairchild AFB within five duty days of arriving on base. At the time of validation, a Fairchild sticker will be issued to replace the previous sticker.

3.5.7. Upon PCS of a sponsor, if dependents choose to remain in the local area, all vehicles will either be de-registered or transferred to a licensed dependent's name, whichever the sponsor chooses.

3.5.8. (Added) Deregistration. Deregistration is accomplished by removing the registration decals and returning them to Pass & Registration, Building 2325.

3.5.8.1. (Added) Since the decal is designed to "self-destruct" when tampered with, record the number prior to removal. Sufficient legible portions of the DD Form 2220 must be returned to Pass & Registration to ensure proper destruction.

3.5.8.2. (Added) Registrants are responsible for the removal of the DD Form 2220 when their vehicles are sold, transferred, or are no longer eligible for registration.

3.5.8.3. (Added) Personnel who fail to properly deregister their vehicles will have their records coded to disallow registration of any further vehicles, until their commander certifies that the vehicle is no longer in the possession of the individual.

3.5.8.4. (Added) Active duty personnel failing to deregister their vehicles are subject to being cited and/or suspended.

3.5.8.5. (Added) Commanders will ensure vehicle registrants report to Pass & Registration for instructions on the disposition of base decals upon PCA, PCS, or separation. This may be accomplished by placing Pass & Registration on the unit's out-processing checklists.

3.5.9. (Added) Deregistration for Cause. Personnel whose driving privileges have been suspended, who are not accompanied by a licensed household member, will immediately remove the base registration decal from all vehicles owned or registered in their name.

3.5.9.1. (Added) Suspended personnel accompanied by a licensed household member will not be required to remove the base registration decals.

3.5.9.2. (Added) Suspended individuals granted restricted driving privileges are not authorized registration decals. Accordingly, they must at all times have in their possession their restricted driving privileges authorization letter.

3.5.9.3. (Added) When a dependent's base driving privileges are suspended or revoked, the sponsor will comply with deregistration requirement for each vehicle owned or primarily operated by the dependent.

4.5.3. (Added) Traffic Accident Reporting. Any operator of a motor vehicle involved in a major accident within the jurisdiction of Fairchild AFB will immediately report the accident to the Security Forces Desk at Building 2071. Failure to report a major accident may result in the violator being cited and six points assessed as "Failure to Report or Fleeing the Scene of an Accident." Individuals involved in minor accidents must report the accident to the Security Forces Desk within 72 hours. A major accident constitutes any of the following: death, any injuries, property damage over \$10,000, disabling damage, or hard to explain circumstances.

4.8.2.1. (Added) Reserved Parking. Reserved parking will be limited to the following:

4.8.2.2. (Added) Government motor vehicles used in direct support of installation departmental mission.

4.8.2.3. (Added) Government motor vehicles used in general support missions, such as couriers, postal, or cargo delivery.

4.8.2.4. (Added) Privately owned vehicles of disabled or handicapped personnel.

4.8.2.5. (Added) Car-pools.

4.8.2.6. (Added) Additional reserved parking will be at the discretion of the installation commander.

4.8.2.7. (Added) Reserved Parking Authorizations. All organizational reserved parking is limited to the Commander, Operations Officer, CMSgt and First Sergeant. Only signs prepared and installed by 92 CES will be recognized as official; others will be removed immediately.

4.8.5. (Added) Parking Violations. A vehicle is parked illegally if not parked within a properly marked parking space.

4.8.5.1. (Added) No vehicle will park or stand within 20 feet of a crosswalk.

4.8.5.2. (Added) No vehicle will park or stand within 30 feet upon approach to any stop sign, yield sign, etc, located at the side of the roadway.

4.8.5.3. (Added) Parked within 15 feet of a fire hydrant, dumpster, or entrance to any fire, ambulance, crash, or aircraft crew vehicle exit which presents a physical obstacle or hazard to possible emergency operations;

4.8.5.4. (Added) Parked within 5 feet of a driveway apron.

4.8.5.5. (Added) Parked or operating a motor vehicle off of the hardened surface (grass, lawns, parks, etc.)

4.8.5.6. (Added) Parked within 15 feet of a building or structure not otherwise designated as an approved parking area.

4.8.5.7. (Added) Parked against the flow of traffic.

4.8.5.8. (Added) Parked blocking a "loading zone."

4.8.5.9. (Added) Parked in reserved parking areas specifically designated as reserved for someone else.

4.8.5.10. (Added) No person shall park a vehicle backwards in an angle parking space with the exception of emergency response equipped vehicles and alert vehicles.

4.8.5.11. (Added) No person shall park his or her vehicle "out of stall," i.e.; parking in a manner that takes more than one parking space.

4.8.5.12. (Added) When available, motorcycle operators must park their motorcycles in spaces reserved for motorcycles. If not available, motorcycles may be parked in regular parking spaces.

4.8.6. (Added) Parking Restrictions. Parking in USAF Military Family Housing Areas will conform to the following:

4.8.6.1. (Added) One parking space located directly in front of each military family housing unit (two-way streets only) is reserved for the occupant assigned to that unit.

4.8.6.2. (Added) Parking on one-way streets will be on the side of the street with the odd numbered addresses unless otherwise posted. Reserved parking on these streets for housing occupants does not exist.

4.8.6.3. (Added) Residents having garages/driveways will not park their vehicles on the street unless they own three or more vehicles with the exception of Galena Station due to the fact that they cannot fit two cars in their driveway.

4.8.6.4. (Added) Major vehicle repairs within the military family housing areas or dormitory parking lots are not permitted. The Auto Skills Center is available for all major vehicle repairs.

NOTE: Major vehicle repairs are considered any repair that renders the vehicle inoperative such as engine overhauls.

4.8.6.5. (Added) Snow Removal. Snow removal will normally be accomplished between the hours of 1700-2300.

4.8.6.6. (Added) Residents will not park in the street during snow removal operations. 92 CES/CEOH will be responsible for notifying residents 24 hours in advance (when possible) of the planned snow removal operations.

4.8.6.7. (Added) As a minimum, from 15 Nov - 31 Mar, RV's, boats, utility trailers and non-operational vehicles must be removed from base streets.

4.9.5.5.4. (Added) When civilians, who have no direct military affiliation, (i.e., visitors, private company contractors, etc.) commit a moving traffic violation on base or become involved in a traffic accident on-base, the Chief, Security Forces or Chief Administration and Reports Branch will annotate the reverse side of the DD Form 1408, **Armed Forces Traffic Ticket**, with the comment, "Driving Record Annotated", and will sign the citation.

4.9.6. (Added) Because concurrent jurisdiction applies to the majority of Fairchild AFB, a Washington State Uniform Court Docket may be issued by a civil law enforcement officer in the performance of his or her duties.

4.9.7. (Added) Ticket Rebuttals. Rebuttals for the DD Form 1408, must be in letter format and submitted within 10 working days after the citation was issued. The rebuttal must include an endorsement and recommendation from the individual's commander or first sergeant and be forwarded to 92 SFS/SFAR for processing through the Chief, Security Forces to the 92 MSG/CD. The 92 MSG/CD is the final decision authority for ticket rebuttals on Fairchild AFB and its properties.

4.11.3. (Added) BAC Verifier Datamaster operators will be certified by the Washington State Toxicologist in the use of the instrument prior to operation.

4.11.4. (Added) A person subject to BAC tests can request additional testing. The requesting individual pays for these tests, in an approved facility such as an off-base hospital or research laboratory performing the test. If they desire admissibility of other tests in a military or civilian court of law, they must ensure the state approves the test and test method. Complete all tests as soon as possible, noting any delay on the resulting documents.

4.11.5. (Added) If someone requests additional testing, the apprehending official may help make those arrangements. However, tests conducted under authority of the UCMJ remain valid when circumstances prevent timely release of the individual, or for whatever reason additional testing is not completed.

4.12.3.1. As a general rule, forced extractions are considered only when an individual is involved in an accident in which there is a death, serious personal injury, or over \$10,000 in property damage and sufficient probable cause exists to justify search authorization. A military magistrate is the approval authority for granting search authorization.

4.18.4. (Added) Revised Code of Washington (RCW). All State of Washington laws pertaining to motor vehicles are assimilated on Fairchild AFB and its properties.

4.18.5. (Added) Enforceability. Those traffic violations not covered in Air Force Instructions will be cited under the RCW.

4.20. (Added) **Speed Limits.** Except as otherwise provided in this supplement, no person shall operate a vehicle within the jurisdiction of Fairchild AFB at a speed greater than is reasonable and prudent considering existing road conditions, and potential hazards.

4.20.1. (Added) Speed limit signs are posted at each entry control point. The maximum speed limit on Fairchild AFB is 30 MPH unless otherwise posted. Specially marked areas are as follows:

4.20.1.1. (Added) 10 MPH in all parking lots.

4.20.1.2. (Added) 10 MPH when passing troop formations.

4.20.1.3. (Added) 15 MPH in all housing areas.

4.20.1.4. (Added) 15 MPH in the Munitions Storage Area.

4.20.1.5. (Added) 20 MPH when entering or departing base gates when no other directions are available.

4.20.1.6. (Added) 20 MPH on the base perimeter road.

4.20.1.7. (Added) 45 MPH on Rambo and Thorpe Roads unless otherwise posted.

4.20.1.8. (Added) Snow removal equipment will be operated at the lowest speed consistent with the effective removal of snow.

4.20.2. (Added) No person shall drive a vehicle or operate a bicycle so as to impede the normal and reasonable movement of traffic, except when reduced speed is necessary for safe operation or to comply with this instruction.

4.20.3. (Added) Compliance with the speed requirement set forth in this instruction does not relieve the vehicle operator from exercising due care and caution as warranted by other circumstances.

4.21. (Added) **Bicycles.** All persons riding bicycles on Fairchild AFB and its associated properties must conform to the following rules.

4.21.1. (Added) A person operating a bicycle must ride upon a permanent or regular seat attached thereto.

4.21.2. (Added) Do not use a bicycle to carry more persons than the number for which it was designed and equipped. Passenger seats must be of regular type and permanently attached to the bicycle.

4.21.3. (Added) Riding abreast with two or more bicycles is prohibited. Riders must remain in single file when riding on the street.

4.21.4. (Added) Operators of bicycles must keep at least one hand on the handlebars during operations.

4.21.5. (Added) All personnel, including dependents that ride bicycles on an installation must wear an approved bicycle helmet. Helmet must be worn properly and fastened. Violators may be cited via the DD Form 1408.

4.21.6. (Added) Persons riding a sled, bicycle, skateboard, skates, wagons or similar device may not hitch onto any motor vehicle. Towing such a device with a motor vehicle or bicycle is also prohibited.

4.21.7. (Added) Bicycles will be operated with the flow of traffic and to the extreme right side of the road and on the shoulder of the road whenever possible. Bicycles may also utilize running or bicycle paths throughout the installation. However, riders must yield the right-of-way to walkers or runners.

4.21.8. (Added) Bicyclists will obey all rules of the road, the same as if they were operating a motorized vehicle.

4.21.9. (Added) Bicyclists will utilize a headlight and taillight during hours of darkness or reduced visibility.

4.22. (Added) **Motorcycles and All Terrain Vehicles (ATVs).** As per AFI 91-207, *The US Air Force Traffic Safety Program*, requirements for motorcycle, motor scooter, and moped operation on Air Force installations and for military personnel off Air Force installations include the following:

4.22.1. (Added) Mopeds are classified as vehicles for the purpose of Chapter 46.12 RCW and will be registered.

4.22.2. (Added) Driver's licenses are required for persons operating mopeds, and operators must be at least 16 years of age. Regular motorcycle plates and tabs will be issued.

4.22.3. (Added) Per Washington State law, motorcycle riders operating on a permit no longer have to be accompanied by another licensed motorcycle rider, however, still cannot have passengers, and may not ride after dark.

4.22.4. (Added) Only operators may ride mopeds—no passengers.

4.22.5. (Added) Headlights must be on.

4.22.6. (Added) Vehicle must have rear view mirrors.

4.22.7. (Added) Operators and any passengers on motorcycles must wear a protective helmet. **NOTE:** Helmets must meet, as a minimum, Department of Transportation (DOT) standards and be worn properly and fastened.

4.22.8. (Added) To increase visibility of riders they are encouraged to affix reflective material to their helmets.

4.22.9. (Added) Operators and passengers must wear impact resistant goggles or a full-face shield on their helmets. **EXCEPTION:** Goggles or a full-face shield are not required for the operator if the motorcycle is equipped with a windshield that is equal in height to or above the top of the helmet of the properly upright seated operator.

4.22.10. (Added) Brightly colored or contrasting vest or jacket must be worn as an outer upper garment during the day. Reflective outer upper garment must be worn during hours of darkness. A reflective belt, strapped across the upper body can suffice. Outer upper garments will be clearly visible and not covered.

4.22.11. (Added) Operators and passengers will wear long sleeved shirts or jackets, full-fingered motorcycle gloves or mittens, and long trousers.

4.22.12. (Added) Sturdy footwear, leather boots or over-the-ankle shoes must be worn.

4.22.13. (Added) All off-road vehicles, i.e., three-wheelers, dirt bikes, quadrunners, etc. will not be registered or operated within Fairchild AFB property. **EXCEPTION:** GOVs and government owned ATV's while in the performance of official duties.

4.22.14. (Added) The minimum age for the operation of a motorcycle or moped on Fairchild AFB is 16 years of age.

4.22.15. (Added) A person operating a two-wheeled motor vehicle must ride upon a permanent or regular seat attached thereto.

4.22.16. (Added) Do not use motorcycles to carry more persons than the number for which it was designed and equipped.

4.22.17. (Added) Riding abreast with two or more motorcycles is prohibited. Motorcycles must be driven adjacent to the centerline of the lane traveled.

4.22.18. (Added) Operators of motorcycles must keep at least one hand on the handlebars during operation.

4.23. (Added) **Miscellaneous Rules.**

4.23.1. (Added) Unattended Motor Vehicles (RCW 46.61.600): No person driving or in charge of a motor vehicle shall permit it to stand unattended without first stopping the engine, locking the ignition, removing the key, when standing upon any perceptible grade, turning the front wheels to the curb or side of the highway.

4.23.2. (Added) Minors in Vehicles (RCW 46.61.685): No person, while operating or in charge of a vehicle, shall park or willfully allow such vehicle to stand upon a public highway or in a public place with its motor running, leaving a minor child or children under the age of sixteen years unattended therein. Driv-

ing privileges can be revoked upon a second or subsequent violation of this paragraph. Violators of this rule are subject to criminal prosecution for child neglect.

4.23.3. (Added) **Minors in Vehicles (Not Running):** Minor children, 6 years and younger, will not be left unattended in a parked vehicle not running. Violators of this rule are subject to criminal prosecution for child neglect.

4.23.4. (Added) **Pets in Vehicles:** No person will leave a pet unattended in a motor vehicle for a period exceeding 15 minutes.

4.23.5. (Added) **Excessively Loud Stereo and Music Noise:** Vehicle operators have a responsibility to ensure music from their vehicles (amplified or not) does not exceed a noise level, which may annoy any person, or offend public decency.

4.23.5.1. (Added) Noise which can be heard outside the vehicle that is deemed by the complainant as annoying, or offending public decency, and not witnessed by security forces will be documented on a Incident/Complaint Report and titled "Public Nuisance Complaint."

4.23.5.2. (Added) Incidents witnessed by security forces may be cited on a DD Form 1408 as "Public Nuisance."

4.23.6. (Added) **Earphones:** The wearing of portable headphones, earphones, or other listening devices while operating a motor vehicle is prohibited. Earphones or headphones may not be worn while walking, jogging, rollerblading, or bicycling on roadways unless a specifically marked path or cross walks is designated. Earphones may be utilized while using designated bicycle/walking paths and sidewalks.

4.23.7. (Added) **Offensive or Obscene Materials:** Any motor vehicle that displays or contains materials, writings, or decals, fitting the definition of indecent or disparaging will be denied entrance onto Fairchild AFB and its associated properties.

4.23.7.1. (Added) **Indecent** is defined as any material, writing, or decal, which is grossly offensive to modesty, decency, or propriety, or shocks the moral sense, because of its vulgar, filthy, or disgusting nature, or its tendency to incite lustful thought. Motor vehicle operators, who are willing to remove the material, will be allowed to proceed.

4.23.7.2. (Added) **Disparaging** is defined as terms used to degrade an individual's race, color, gender or national origin, religion or age.

4.23.8. (Added) **Crossing Fire Department Hoses:** No vehicle will be driven over any unprotected fire hose without the consent of the fire department official in command.

4.23.9. (Added) **U-Turns:** U-turns are prohibited on Fairchild AFB, except when encountering a locked gate. Emergency vehicles are permitted to make U-turns when on an emergency response when it does not interfere with other traffic present.

4.23.10. (Added) **Overloading:** No vehicle shall be overloaded so as to obstruct the driver's view or to prohibit the wearing of individual seatbelts.

4.23.11. (Added) **Improper Starts:** An improper start from a stopped position or high acceleration from a low speed that intentionally causes a breaking of traction on a hard surface is prohibited.

4.23.12. (Added) **Overtaking and Passing:** Passing is prohibited within 100 feet of an intersection, a marked crosswalk, a railway crossing, congested areas, school zones and streets marked with solid yellow lines.

4.23.12.1. (Added) Passing is permitted at intersections, to the right, when the vehicle immediately in front is negotiating a left turn and the vehicle passing does not have to leave the roadway.

4.23.12.2. (Added) Passing of street sweepers and slow moving vehicles is authorized when the vehicle operator of the slower vehicle hand signals it is safe to pass.

4.23.12.3. (Added) Housing areas are designated no-passing areas.

4.23.13. (Added) Improper Backing: No person shall back a vehicle more than 50 feet upon any street, roadway, or parking lot, anytime except on dead end driveways or streets where a forward exit cannot be made.

4.23.13.1. (Added) Improper backing resulting in an accident or causing an evasive maneuver by another vehicle operator may be cited via DD Form 1408.

4.23.14. (Added) Headlights: Headlights will be operated in accordance with the Revised Code of Washington.

4.23.14.1. (Added) During the hours of darkness, drivers will dim headlights to parking lights when approaching installation entrance gates. Operators of vehicles equipped with daytime running lights are exempt from this requirement. However, they should attempt to disengage the headlights by pushing the emergency brake one (1) click.

4.23.14.2. (Added) Headlights will be utilized during periods of inclement weather.

4.23.15. (Added) Radar Detection Devices: The operation of radar detection devices to indicate the presence of speed recording instruments or to transmit simulated erroneous speed on Fairchild AFB and its properties is prohibited.

4.24. (Added) **Stopping:** No person shall stop a vehicle at the following locations except to avoid conflict with other traffic, to comply with the law, or at the direction of a person controlling traffic.

4.24.1. (Added) Within an intersection;

4.24.2. (Added) On the traveled portion of any thoroughfare;

4.24.3. (Added) In any place where it constitutes a traffic hazard or causes congestion.

NOTE: (When a vehicle has a disabling mechanical failure, immediately push it off the roadway and set up warning devices (flares, reflectors, emergency flashers, or other lawful equipment).

4.25. (Added) **Right-of-Way.**

4.25.1. (Added) When approaching an intersection that is not controlled by traffic lights or signs, you must yield the right-of-way to any vehicle in or approaching the intersection at the same time from your right.

4.25.2. (Added) All vehicle operators will yield the right-of-way to moving snowplows. No vehicle will approach within 50 feet of the rear, or 25 feet of the front, or 10 feet of the sides of operating snowplows.

4.25.3. (Added) All motor vehicles will yield the right-of-way to a marching or physical training formation.

4.25.4. (Added) All motor vehicles and pedestrians will yield the right-of-way to responding emergency vehicles.

4.26. (Added) **Seat Belts.**

4.26.1. (Added) Seat belts will be properly worn by military personnel on and off base, whether on or off-duty as operators or passengers, in a government or privately owned vehicle. All personnel residing on, visiting, or transiting Fairchild AFB will comply with Washington State law concerning the use of seat belts. All nonuse of occupant protective devices shall be enforced as a primary traffic violation; per DODI 6055.4 *DoD Traffic Safety Program*.

4.26.2. (Added) Whenever a child who is less than sixteen years of age is being transported in a motor vehicle that is in operation and that is required by RCW 46.37.510 to be equipped with a safety belt system in a passenger seating position, the driver of the vehicle shall keep the child properly restrained as follows:

4.26.2.1. (Added) If the child is less than six years old and/or sixty pounds and the passenger seating position equipped with a safety belt system allows sufficient space for installation, then the child will be restrained in a child restraint system that complies with standards of the United States Department of Transportation and that is secured in the vehicle in accordance with instructions of the manufacturer of the child restraint system;

4.26.2.2. (Added) If the child is less than one year of age or weighs less than twenty pounds, the child shall be properly restrained in a rear-facing infant seat;

4.26.2.3. (Added) If the child is more than one but less than four years of age or weighs less than forty pounds but at least twenty pounds, the child shall be properly restrained in a forward facing child safety seat restraint system;

4.26.2.4. (Added) If the child is less than six but at least four years of age or weighs less than sixty pounds but at least forty pounds, the child shall be properly restrained in a child booster seat.

4.26.2.5. (Added) If the child is six years of age or older or weighs more than sixty pounds, the child shall be properly restrained with the motor vehicle's safety belt properly adjusted and fastened around the child's body or an appropriately fitting booster seat.

4.27. (Added) **Defective Vehicles:** Defective vehicle violations will be corrected within five days after being cited. The vehicle operator will report to the security forces desk for verification of the correction within this five-day period.

4.28. (Added) **Towing:** The drawbar or other connection between vehicles in combination shall be of sufficient strength to hold the weight of the towed vehicle on any grade where operated. When a disabled vehicle is being towed by means of a bar, chain, rope, cable or similar means, and the distance between the two vehicles exceeds fifteen feet, a white flag or cloth not less than twelve inches square will be connected near the center of the device.

4.29. (Added) **Recreational Vehicles (RVs):** The following type vehicles are classified as RVs: Mini-motor homes or motor homes 17 feet or longer, pickup trucks with a slide-in, self-contained camper units and vehicles that are towing any type of trailer.

4.29.1. (Added) Boats, trailers, RVs utility or house trailers will not be parked on streets within the housing area. Exception: see para. **4.29.4. (Added)**

4.29.2. (Added) Boats and camping trailers may be parked in the housing area driveways during "frequent use" months from 1 April through 31 October. During this period, while parked in driveways, no major maintenance will be allowed and will not force the parking of more than one motor vehicle on the street.

4.29.3. (Added) Storing of boxes, cases, tools, or camping equipment under the trailer is strictly prohibited.

4.29.4. (Added) Boats, campers, RVs and utility or house trailers that are hitched to motor vehicles may be parked along the streets of the housing areas or in dorm parking lots overnight if an early departure is planned the next morning or upon return for unloading purposes. A limit of 24-hours will be allowed for the parking of these trailers.

4.29.5. (Added) Motor vehicle truck campers will not be parked along the housing area streets where a driveway has been provided.

4.29.6. (Added) Campers/RVs/Boat Storage Lot: These vehicles may be stored, depending on the waiting list, in this lot after contacting Services Equipment Checkout Section. A fee is required.

4.30. (Added) **Alert Force Response Routes.** All Alert Force routes that are marked either by signs or flashing red lights will be strictly enforced. If the lights along the alert route are flashing, all other traffic must pull over to the side of the road and yield the right-of-way to all alert force vehicles. Traffic must remain at the side of the road until the flashing red lights have been turned off. Any individual who fails to yield along the alert force routes or who fails to pull over to the side of the road will be cited via the DD Form 1408, and assessed (4) points accordingly.

4.31. (Added) **Pedestrians.**

4.31.1. (Added) The driver of a vehicle shall yield right-of-way to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within a marked crosswalk, when the pedestrian is upon the half of the roadway which the vehicle is traveling, or when the pedestrian is approaching so closely from the opposite half of the roadway as to be in danger.

4.31.2. (Added) No pedestrian shall suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield.

4.31.3. (Added) Whenever any vehicle is stopped at a marked crosswalk or at any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection to permit a pedestrian to cross the roadway, the driver of any other vehicle approaching from the rear shall not overtake and pass such stopped vehicle.

4.31.4. (Added) Every pedestrian crossing a roadway at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles upon the roadway.

4.31.5. (Added) Where no sidewalks are provided, pedestrians shall walk on the extreme left of the roadway, facing traffic.

4.31.6. (Added) No pedestrian shall walk upon the roadways, sidewalks, parking lots, or grounds with an open container of alcohol or while drinking, consuming, or ingesting alcoholic beverages, except at "official functions" which have been approved by the unit commander or first sergeant.

6.2.3.3. (Added) Vehicles parked in an authorized parking area that cannot be moved due to defects, such as, flat tires, no engine, or any vehicle, which presents an "eyesore," will be considered abandoned. These vehicles will be issued a DD Form 2504, **Abandoned Vehicle Notice**, and impounded after 72 hours if corrective actions are not taken. Vehicles parked in violation of the snow removal plan or those, which interfere with snow removal operations, may be towed at the owner's expense.

6.3.4. (Added) Towing and Storage. Vehicles towed by an U.S. Government tow truck will be stored at the Base Impound Lot.

6.7.11. (Added) **Forms Adopted.** DD Form 2504, **Abandoned Vehicle Notice**
